WORDS OF WISDOM

January 6, the Feast of Epiphany, celebrates the story of the magi coming to visit the Christ Child in Bethlehem (see Matthew 2:1-12). The word “epiphany” comes from a Greek word which means “to show forth,” or “shine light upon.” The magi in Matthew 2 noticed the light of a star and traveled toward Israel to investigate. These seekers, drawn by the light of Christ, came to offer their gifts and to offer themselves in worshipping Christ, who is Emmanuel, God-with-us. With this story of foreigners being drawn toward to the light of Christ and welcomed into his presence, Matthew’s gospel signals that the good news of Christ is for everyone, and not just a chosen few. Christ is light for the nations, for all peoples. Echoing its beginning, Matthew’s gospel ends with the risen Christ drawing his disciples together and commissioning them to “go, make disciples of all nations” (Matthew 28:19). As the Magi worship the infant Christ at the beginning of the gospel, so also the disciples worship the risen Christ at its end, and hear

the promise “I am with you always” (Matthew 28:20).

The theme of light shining forth through Christ is interwoven throughout Matthew’s gospel. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus calls his followers to “let your light shine before others, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven” (Matthew 5:16). This verse, which is spoken to each newly baptized person as they are presented with a candle during the baptismal service, shapes our lives as seekers and as disciples. Drawn to the light of Christ, we are welcomed by the one who is Emmanuel, God with us. We are encouraged to not hide our lights (see Matthew 5:15), but to let them shine, as mirrors reflecting Christ’s light in the context of our daily lives. This word comes to us both as an invitation and a calling. As the modern hymn writer David Haas writes,

Come! Live in the light!
Shine with the joy and the love
of the Lord!
We are called to be light for
the kingdom,
to live in the freedom of the
city of God.

We are called to act with justice,
we are called to love tenderly;
we are called to serve one another,
to walk humbly with God.

Text: David Haas, b. 1957
(ELW 720, verse 1)

Together with the magi, the first disciples, and all who seek Christ, we are invited to enter the story, live the story, and share the story.

Let your lights shine, and claim the promise of Christ, Emmanuel, present with you and shining in and through us with God’s light and love and life. Come, let us live in the light, and walk humbly with God.



PARISH NURSE NEWS

Flu or Cold Symptoms?

When you wake up sneezing, coughing, and have that achy, feverish, can't move a muscle feeling, how do you know whether you have cold symptoms or the flu?

It's important to know the difference between flu and cold symptoms. A cold is a milder respiratory illness than the flu. While cold symptoms can make you feel bad for a few days, flu can make you feel quite ill for a few days to weeks. The flu can also result in serious health problems such as pneumonia and hospitalizations.

What are common cold symptoms?

Cold symptoms usually begin with a sore throat, which usually goes away after a day or two. Nasal symptoms, runny nose, and congestion follow, along with a cough by the fourth and fifth days. Fever is uncommon in adults, but a slight fever is possible. Children are more likely to have a fever with a cold.

With cold symptoms, the nose teems with watery nasal secretions for the first few days. Later, these become thicker and darker. Dark mucus is natural and does not usually mean you have developed a bacterial infection, such as a sinus infection.

Several hundred different viruses may cause your cold symptoms.

How long do cold symptoms last?

Cold symptoms usually last for about a week. During the first three days that you have cold

symptoms, you are contagious. This means you can pass the cold to others, so stay home and get some much-needed rest.

If cold symptoms do not seem to be improving after a week, you may have a bacterial infection, which means you may need antibiotics.

Sometimes you may mistake cold symptoms for allergic rhinitis (hay fever) or a sinus infection. If cold symptoms begin quickly and are improving after a week, then it is usually a cold, not allergy. If your cold symptoms do not seem to be getting better after a week, check with your doctor to see if you have developed an allergy or sinusitis.

What are common flu symptoms?

Flu symptoms are usually more severe than cold symptoms and come on quickly. Symptoms of flu include sore throat, fever, headache, muscle aches and soreness, congestion, and cough. Swine flu in particular is also associated with vomiting and diarrhea.

Most flu symptoms gradually improve over two to five days, but it's not uncommon to feel run down for a week or more. A common complication of the flu is pneumonia, particularly in the young, elderly, or people with lung or heart problems. If you notice shortness of breath, let your doctor know. Another common sign of pneumonia is fever that comes back after having been gone for a day or two. Just like cold viruses, flu viruses enter your body through the mucous membranes of the nose, eyes, or mouth. Every time you touch your hand to one of these areas, you could be infecting yourself with a virus, which makes it very important to keep hands germ-free with frequent washing to prevent

both flu and cold symptoms.

Is it flu or cold symptoms?

How do you know if you have flu or cold symptoms? Take your temperature, say many experts. Flu symptoms often mimic cold symptoms with nasal congestion, cough, aches, and malaise. But a common cold rarely has symptoms of fever above 101 degrees. With flu symptoms, you will probably have a fever initially with the flu virus and you will feel miserable. Body and muscle aches are also more common with the flu.

When do I call the doctor with flu or cold symptoms?

If you already have flu or cold symptoms, it's important to call your doctor if you also have any of the following severe symptoms:

- **Persistent fever:** This can be a sign of another bacterial infection that should be treated.
- **Painful swallowing:** Although a sore throat from a cold or flu can cause mild discomfort, severe pain could mean strep throat, which requires treatment by a doctor.
- **Persistent coughing:** When a cough doesn't go away after two or three weeks, it could be bronchitis, which may need an antibiotic. Postnasal drip or sinusitis can also result in a persistent cough. In addition, asthma is another cause of persistent coughing.
- **Persistent congestion and headaches:** When colds and allergies cause congestion and blockage of sinus passages, they can lead to a sinus infection (sinusitis). If you have pain around the eyes and face with thick nasal discharge after a week, you may have a bacterial

infection and possibly need an antibiotic. Most sinus infections, however, do not need an antibiotic.

In some cases, you may need to get emergency medical attention right away. In adults, signs of a crisis include:

- Severe chest pain
- Severe headache
- Shortness of breath
- Dizziness
- Confusion
- Persistent vomiting

In children, additional signs of an emergency are:

- Difficulty breathing or rapid breathing
- Bluish skin color
- Not drinking enough fluids
- Lethargy and failure to interact normally

- Extreme irritability or distress
 - Symptoms that were improving and then suddenly worsen
- Fever with a rash


